VAMIS and COVID-19: Due to our ability and Deighton's ability to telework, COVID-19 has not impacted our project development nor the VAMIS implementation schedule dramatically. We have made a few adjustments as to how we gather data and reorganized a few of the assets in the sprint order to keep VAMIS on track with asset migration and data preparation tasks. Closely monitoring our resources (labor and time) and our ability to transition data between the Agency and Deighton, our project vendor, has kept us on schedule. Advance preparation with our data stewards has been key to continuing to stay on track, and we would like to thank everyone for their efforts to get us information in a timely manner.

Budget: Some consider this a four-letter word, however without knowing what we spend for repairs or improvements we cannot do our jobs effectively or efficiently. The ability to track spending by asset and establish necessary funds for needed repairs is a core function of VAMIS. Knowing factually with evidence of what costs can be deferred and where repairs must happen improves our ability to maintain the entire network. Through VAMIS we can make better decisions, *more strategic decisions*.

While bridges and paving may see the lion's share of the Agency budget, we cannot ignore the role our other assets play. The **Cross Asset Analysis Operation (CAAO)** is a tool within VAMIS that will let us see how conditions for each asset improve or deteriorate depending upon different budget scenarios. As we gather and collate our data (real-time observations) in VAMIS, we will improve our ability to predict asset condition and assess future funding needs.



RETAINING WALLS FACT

There are 223 retaining walls in our current asset inventory on 42 different state routes. They vary greatly in construction methods with the average height at 6.9 ft and an average length of 204 feet. By location District 7 has the most at 43 and District 5 has the fewest at 8.
